We have been investigating floating and sinking in our class topic of pirates. We all made pirate ships and then tested whether they would float.

Year 3

Mrs Incledon came to Year 3 to help us make our very own cave art, just like people from the Stone Age. She told us all about how people recorded their existence long before they had pens and pencils like us.

We used the same natural minerals that people would have used to



make paint thousands of years ago, including chalk from Cley Hill, charcoal, and yellow ochre that Mrs Incledon collected and dried herself!

We had a go at drawing around our own hands and experimenting with the materials, then came together to create our own class mural.



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We have been looking at a new book called 'Leon and the Place Between', about a boy who goes to the circus and is transported to a magical world. We listened to music from the circus, watched a video clip of a circus performance, and then created our own circus tents with the performers inside to help us with our setting descriptions.



In History, we have been looking at photos of artefacts from Ancient Egypt to find out about their lifestyle and how they lived. We presented our research to the rest of the class.

Year 4

Gardiner the children have been planning and making their own marble mazes. The children have created their own point scoring system and then created obstacles to go on their mazes e.g. ramps and tunnels.








Year 4 have been creating timelines of British history to gain an understanding of the different invaders and settlers of Britain.

Year 5


In Science, Year 5 have been looking at forces. We have been learning how the different forces act around us and what impact they have on our world. We have carried out many investigations such as testing bouancy using tin foil boats and seeing if levers can allow us to lift a mass using less force.





In RE year 5 have been looking at the structure of our local Church. We were lucky enough to have Father Richard come into school to talk to the children about the structure of the church and how it effects our local church.







Mrs Briggs came into Year 5 to teach the children how to use computing software called 'crumble'. The children loved learning how to create the code and watch as the code on the computer lit up the small sparkle in a variety of colours.





For the start of our living things and their habitats topic the children took a look around the school grounds to see what living things they could find. We then used our scientific knowledge to classify them.

Year 6

On Wednesday 29th January Year 6 were taught their computing session by Mrs Briggs, who is a computing specialist. Working in pairs, she gave them instructions on how to

set up a computing resource we have at St Louis called Crumble.

They then made predictions of and explored different programs to make an LED light (a sparkle) turn different colours. They then thought of their own algorithm and program for the sparkle to imitate traffic



Year 6 have really been enjoying their Crime and Punishment topic this half term, particularly finding out about the punishments for crimes during the Roman period. These were particularly harsh to try to deter people from committing a crime in the first place. They learnt that the Anglo-Saxons had a system called 'weregild', which meant that if you injured someone, you had to pay for the damage! Here they

are finding out how much money had to be paid for different injured body parts.

To start their new writing unit, which involves the book 'The Last Wild' by Piers Torday, Year 6 were shown a school lunch from the future. They were extremely inquisitive, bursting with questions about the unfamiliar sight and



predictions about what that future might look like. They are really looking forward to reading more of the book to hopefully find out the answers to their questions and inspire their own stories set in the future.
